The Musical Society will operate on a much freer framework so as to appeal to all students at the University who are even remotely interested in music. Its activity groups— choir, folk and blues, music—reading class, "appreciation" (records, group bookings at concerts, opera etc.), "development" (for singers, pianists etc. who wish to concertrate on solo or small group work) and such instrumental groups as talent suggests— will be organized so that each member of TUMS will be able to participate in at least one, and thus develop all his musical inclinations more fully than was possible before.

We've planned a tremendous Orientation Week Concert entitled "at Last! The Monster Gaudeamus Show!" The opening chorus is "Gaudeamus" backed by instrumental jam. The choir's serious offering will be the Peasant Cantata, then follow folk and blues, recorder consort, trumpet ensemble and more light-hearted items like "Sideways," "Canticle", and that satirical masterpiece "God Save the

Queen" by tutti.

We perform once a week for the Dungeon Coffee Shoppe in the city and at the end of term we will present

26th. Intervarsity Choral Festival Manifesto.

The 26th Intervarsity Choral Festival will be held in Sydney in 1975.

Time of Year.

Having considered the response to our questionnaire in Erato No. 8, where opinion was plainly equally divided, we, the members of the 26th. IVCF Steering Committee, feel that we have been given a clear mandate to make a decision on your behalf as to what time of year the festival should be held. The lack of aggreement between the various university administrations regarding the coincidence of May vacations has made us realise that January would be a better time of the year than May. The availability of venues and lack of alternative musical entertainment in January as opposed to May was a furthere important factor.

Intervarsity Music.

The veiw of this committee is that performance standards at previous Intervarsities have been so low as to alienate the best professional musicians that this country has to offer, as experience over the last five years has shown. Obviously the answer lies in achieving a different attitude from the choristers involved. It is therefore our intention to pull up the music l standard of IVCF by the

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bootstraps.

There are many approaches which may be taken in the organisation of an Intervarsity Choral Festival:

1. 'The Philip Britton Concept.'

Intervarsity is primarily a time for members of university choral societies to meet one another socially and obviously springing from this, they should sing together as this is their common interest. The enjoyment gained from singing together is far more important than the achievment of a high performance standard. We feel with this concept that a public concert should not be undertaken because no serious attempt would be made to reach an acceptable performance standard,

2. The Public Concert Approach.
The alternative is the concept attempted ay numerous IVCF's: the idea of aiming towards a public concert containing usually a major work or works performed by the combined choirs, and of late, a second concert by the individual choirs. As we stated earlier, past performance standards have not been satisfactory.

3. The "No Concert" Approach,
A third concept is to have no public concert,
Instead IVCF would be centred around workshops about choral music, e.g. studying and rehearsing particular works, either of different musical periods or of differing musical resources. We feel there is a basic lack of background knowledge amongst university choristers about the music they are singing. For example: Elementary Choral Music History. Place the following composers in chronologial order: Bach, Bartok, Beethoven, Bruckner, Monteverdi, Mozart, Palestrina.

This facet of choral music has not been explored and we consider a higher musical standard will be achieved if cheristers can be given background information about the composers and works which they are preparing. Since there is obviously more satisfaction in performong this music than in rehearsing with no goal in mind, an alternative to an attempt to foist an underrehearsed concert programme on the public exists in the form of a recording session. In the Intervarsity concert the recording suffers from two main defects: the singing standard is never as good as it could be, nor are the recording conditions. With studio conditions and no paying audience we can improve the recording of not the singing itself.

The reason we consider that none of these approaches is the ultimate answer in itself is that we feel that an improved musical standard will give more satisfaction to all concerned, thus raising the status of IVCF. A method that obviously springs to mind is to get the best professional conductors. This, however, has not proved to be an adequate incentive to improve the standard owing to lack of support by the choristers. This is indicated by the fact that these men can get excellent results with other choirs. We believe that the Intervarsity choir is potentially as good as any amateur choir in Australia, particularly in veiw of the fact that if held in January, choristers attending would have h had at least one year's experience.

This committee is questioning even the basic con-

cepts of IVCF. Arguments were raised at Brisbane IVCF last May regarding the desirability of either or both the combined concert and individual items concert, both of which have obvious faults and most often do not reach a reasonable standard. Individual Items in particular has the fault of lacking coherence in programming, and the combined concert is held by some to be "conceptually superfluous".

Intervarsity Choral Festival must make a decision about its future. As the only National choral festival, it has an obligation to itself and to the musical public of Australia, whose standards are constantly becoming more demanding. IVCF must meet the challenge.
