


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# EDITORIAL

Use two crane bases made from six-inch squares of light brown paper.

Note: Be careful to fold the tail short because a short tail is a characteristic of the 34/VCF devall. When you have finished the model arrange theorems to make him look as if he were about to conduct.

#### Head Section PTO

- First turn the tips of the bottom points in as shown. Peak and valley fold each point as indicated for a reverse fold inside out.
- Narrow the legs by valley folding the top flap on the dotted line. Turn the model over and repeat.
- 3. Valley fold the model in half on the dotted line.
- 4. Valley fold on the dotted line for a reverse fold inside out.
- Peak and valley fold as indicated to bring the flap (both layers) over to the position you see in step 7.
- 6. The process of pulling the flaps over.
- 7. Peak and valley fold on the indicated dotted
- 8. Valley fold on the dotted lines to squash fold the sides of the ofrivall's head into the position you see in step 9. Peak and valley fold the hands and arms as indicated.

#### Rear Section PTO


- 2 Valley fold on the dotted lines.
- Narrow the lower point by valley folding on the dotted lines. Concentrate on lining the outer edges with the center line, and the sec ondary folds will naturally fall into place.
- 4 Valley fold on the dotted line.
- 5 Valley fold on the dotted line.
- 6 Peak and valley fold the tail, and crimp it inward. Peak and valley fold the legs as indicated, and crimp them inward.
- 7 The completed rear section. See photograph on page 143.
- Join the two sections, and glue them together If you are making a regular drivall, leave the tail long.




#### Crane Base : Make +wo

Use a six-inch square of paper

- 1 Book fold the sheet in half horizontally. Peak and valley fold on the dotted lines (two layers).
- 2 Peak and valley fold on the dotted lines. The valley folds are inversions of existing creases.
- 3 Pull at the places and in the directions the arrows indicate to form the square shown in step 4
- 4 Valley fold on the dotted lines in numerical order, top two layers only in the case of fold 1
- 5 The model should look like this.
- 6 Pull the bottom point up to the position indicated by the dotted lines. All indicated folds are inversions of existing crosses.



#### Beware of baritones

WHY do baritones have more sexual affairs than tenors do, and why are they more success oriented? The answer may lie in their hormones. Some years ago a German research group found that baritones have higher ratios of testosterone (the male sex hormone) to the tenore do.

testosterone (the male sex hormone) to oestradiol (female sex hormone), than tenors do. Glenn Wilson of the Institute of Psychiatry mailed a questionnaire to 350 professional opera singers in London, asking them to rate their own physical and emotional characteristics.


Results show that baritones were 4 cm taller than tenors, though both weighed 6 kg more than average. Self-reports of a greater sex drive and ambition rate them higher on "maleness" than tenors: nonular comment has it that tenors

and ambition rate them higher on "maleness" than tenors; popular comment has it that tenors are "too much in love with themselves" to become involved with others.

The difference in voice types is due to the lengthening of the vocal cords at puberty, then under sex-hormone control. Sexual and aggressive behaviour are similarly influenced. So, if a man tries to pick you up, ask him to sing you Old Man River.














## Queensland University Musical Society 19,





Bevan Leviston will be our chorus master, and the organist for the Scarlatti. Bevan is also well known to choral folk. He started singing with UNCS in Sydney, conducted MONUCS for 4 years from 1974-78 and founded Ars Nova, an early music instrument and choral group in Melbourne. He has been to many I.V.'s; was conductor for the Melbourne Minifest in 1980 and chorus master at 1983 I.V.

For the major concert work, David Fanshawe's "African Sanctus", we will be conducted by Faye Dumont.
