



According to the AIVCC minutes, a motion in this regard will be tabled at the AIVCC scheduled for the Brisbane IV camp (date and time TBA).


Also, I am looking at the basic perceptions people have about what use AICSA actually is, and what they see its role as.

Dear AICSA followers and others,

Well AICSA, for those who don't know, is the governing body of Choral Societies and Intervarsity Festivals (you will find out about it very soon!). The president of AICSA is me(!!!), Jacqui Harrison. I am a student in the Monash University Music Dept. doing a Masters in Indonesian Music and

also another degree in Criminology and Police Studies — sounds crazy doesn t it. I am also a part-time school teacher and the Deputy Warden of a college residence at Monash. Sophie Gordon-Clark is the Treasurer and has been a member of MonUCS and Festival committees for a number of years. Jon is a second year student at the University of Sydney and the President of the Steering Committee for the next Sydney IV.C.F. It is important to get to know us so that you can find out about us and the things that AICSA gets up to.

AICSA has been working very hard over the holiday period organising and planning for the year ahead. One of the things promised at the last AICSA meeting in July in Sydneywas the final up-date of the AICSA music catalogue. The catalogue up-date is well under way and moving quickly; there is actually heaps more work than anticipated and finding someone with the expertise to continue the project was suicide! Katie Purvis is the lucky person who finally agreed to finish the catalogue (she actually designed it in the first place), so if you need to ask inreim questions contact her directly. The most important thing that AICSA societies need to know of recent times is the new way that all societies will function when borrowing music from the Canberra Choral Society Music Lending Scheme. In the past AICSA has held the membership on behalf of all societies and given the scheme all details regarding society librarian contacts and continuous updates of everything under the sun! While AICSA has collected the information and passed it onto the scheme the contacts themselves have not maintained the updates of notification of change of address etc. The result of this is the cancellation of AICSA s membership. The societies are now going to be responsible for their own membership for 1993 and AICSA is making negotiations with the scheme for 1994.

Things to note for 1993 are renewal of AICSA membership (details to be posted) and the AICSA meeting in Brisbane in July. The AICSA meeting will take place at the camp early in the first week during Brisbane IVCF. The reason that I am telling you all now is because of the necessity in getting reports to us by June 1/93 and not on the first day of the camp. Reports should be sent to me directly by this date (20 copies) or fear the worst – it will not be accepted on the first day of the camp – do I need to repeat this again?

Anyway our contacts are listed here and we would love to hear from you if you we got ideas or suggestions. Congratulations to Lucy for getting this edition together and her support of the Exec.

Things that make you go mmmm......

The AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL CHORAL ASSOCIATION [ANCA] INCORPORATED was formed in 1990 by the amalgamation of two existing choral organisations, the Australian Choral Conductors Association and the Australian Choral Association. Since this amalgamation, ANCA has grown to be a truly national body with branches in all states.

ANCA's aims and objectives are stated fully in its constitution but may be summarised as follows:

- * To stimulate interest and participation in choral and vocal music throughout Australia through discussion, workshops, seminars, conventions, masterclasses, sharing of programmes and activities, educational events and through contributing to public knowledge of the arts of choral and vocal music;
- * To help improve the skills of conductors, performers and composers professionally engaged in choral music;
- * To encourage the provision of career training in educational and other institutions for professions in relation to choral and vocal groups
- * To encourage the growth of choral programmes in schools and the development of choral music in regional centres, in particular non-metropolitan centres
- * To foster support for and promote the composition, performance and publication of Australian choral and vocal music.
- * To provide information about choral and vocal activities through the print and non-print media;
- * To organise festivals, concerts and other choral and vocal activities.

ANCA's journal, SING OUT, is issued to members four times a year and its articles give sound, practical advice on all aspects of choral music and provide inspiration and motivation. SING OUT is edited by Blanka West and well known UCS identity, inaugural Life Member of MonUCS and veteran of a lucky 13 IVCFs Katie Purvis!!! Articles in recent volumes have included a two-part interview with Rodney



Eichenberger on choral conducting and singing [with illustrative photographs]; choral warm-ups; a two-part summary of the choral singing workshop given by Eric Ericson; the President of ANCA's report on the Second World Symposium on Choral Music etc. SING OUT also regularly features part or whole of a new Australian choral composition and news of choirs and choral activities from around Australia. In 1993 a new column - Student Notes - will focus on concerns of tertiary students involved in choral music.

ANCA supports and promotes the art of choral music Australia-wide through the development of choral conductors, singers and composers and represents professionals and amateurs at all levels of choral music.



ANCA is administered by its members - by electing a National Committee at the Annual General Meeting. Also members of a State may choose to form a State Branch and elect a State Committee. This has happened in most states. Furthermore members in particular region may decide to form Regional Committees.

National Conventions & Symposiums

Held every two years, past conventions have taken place in Sydney, Brisbane and Melbourne with people attending from all over Australia.

Past symposium topics have included: Conducting Techniques, Use of Gesture, Voice Training, Rehearsal Techniques, Choral Repertoire, Jazz Choral Workshop, Church Music, Performing with Young Voices, Warm-up Technique, Vocal Health, Business Skills and Promotion for Choirs, Choral Arranging.

Hope and pray to see you there, but my thesis is due 5 days after IV.





Greetings and Salutations!

It is frightening to think that it is as long as it is since we were all enjoying our respective New Years; some of us enjoying ourselves more than others at a truly wonderful NYEPfest!

On December 11, MonUCS successfully presented their Christmas extravaganza at the beautiful Wesley Uniting Church in Melbourne CBD. The concert began with 8 members of MonUCS, The Monash Chamber Singers , performing a bracket of pieces under the direction of Catherine Loke; the Cantate Domino and Adoramus of Claudio Monteverdi, and the surprisingly difficult Aeternae Laudis Lillium by Fayrfax. These pieces were performed from memeory, and were received warmly by the modestly sized audience. whole choir then gave a sturdy performance of the Missa Brevis Sancti Joannis de Deo (Little Organ Mass) of Joseph Haydn. This featured members of the Monash Philharmonic, organist Lachlan Redd, and soprano Dame Jacqueline Melaena Harrison. The highlight (lowlight?) of the evening, however, was a highly entertaining presentation of the staged nativity play The First Nowell by Vaughan WIlliams. Based on medieval pageants, it was set in Medieval England and costumed accordingly. The audience seemed to be in fits of laughter for most of the play s duration (it was meant to be a comic presentation), and in contrast sat quietly enjoying the heavenly noises emitted by the angel chorus who sang from a floodlit balcony above the organ pipes and the High Altar. On Christmas Eve I conducted about 40 MonUCS at All Saints Church, Kooyong, where we again sang the Haydn Mass, as well as other carols, responses and the like. So appreciative were the large congregation that they broke their mass to burst into thunderous applause - not a bad effort for Anglicans - and we all got pissed at a chicken and champagne supper afterwards.

Our traditional New Year's Day cricket match with MUCS was of course postponed due to the revelry inAdelaide, and so we eventually played it out in near 40 degree heat on the 1st of Feb. Breaking from tradition, we decided to field two MonMUC teams, and the obligatory draw was conclusively reached. The day before, a large group of us slowly baked in the sun whilst listening to the Queen of the Night melt at the Opera in the Bowl.

On Saturday, May 22, MonUCS will jointly present a concert of Music from the New Worls and Beyond with MUCS. To be staged at the Robert Blackwood Hall, the concert will include performances of the Bernstein Chichester Psalms, Barber Agnus Dei (choral transcription of the famous Adagio), Dvorak Te Deum Op. 103, and numerous a cappella pieces. The exciting New Monash Orchestra have been engaged, and they will also perform Rodeo: Four Dance Episodes by

Copland. With an expected choir of over 200 voices, this concert promises to be the biggest choral event since African Sanctus in 1989.

Towards the end of last year, MonUCS was honoured to receive an invitation to tour to Russia as the guests of the Moscow State Choir. Since that time, plans have been progressing well, and written invitations have now been received from the MSC s Directors and Conductor. The invitation includes joint concerts, workshops, cultural tours and the recording of a CD in Moscow. The tour is planned for November/December, and at this stage will include visits to and performances in Moscow, St. Petersburg, Novgorod, Vladimir, Yaroslavl and Zagorsk. A deal from Japan Airlines also includes a stopover on downtown Tokyo. Touring as the 100 Voices of Russian Australia , we will be accompanied by members of some of Melbourne s Russian Community in as much of our fundraising as possible. All profits from concerts in Russia will be donated by us towards the restoration of the cultural heritage of the Russian Church.

Whilst our repertoire has not yet been completely finalised, it will certainly include a large number of Russian sacred works by composers such as Bortniansky, Rachmaninov, Dyektyaryov, Allemanov and Tchaikovsky, as well as Prokofiev's Alexander Nevsky, and numerous Australian works, probably including a set of Grainger's Folk Songs, and possibly Brumby's Three Baroque Angels.

In a major cultural exchange, we would also play host to the Moscow State Choir, bringing them back to Australia and performing with them in Melbourne, and possibly Sydney and Adelaide. Major fundraising has commenced for the tour, and the numerous concerts are planned in Melbourne, Geelong, Ballarat and Clayton throughout July, August, September and October.

On July 28, MonUCS will perform with the acclaimed Swiss Brass Ensemble ABBE, who are touring Australia. We will perform numerous works, including the Rutter *Gloria* in the Robert Blackwood Hall. This will add to a very international year for this humble choir from Clayton!!!

In the meantime, O-Week is upon us, and judging from our first pre-O-Week rehearsal, 1993 is going to be a big year for us. What with combined camps, tours, concerts, recordings etc., we are all set to have a lot of fun. Added to that of course, is our undying commitment to the IV movement - Canberra in April, Brisbane in July, Adelaide in January, and well then there s Melbourne (and we could never forget that could we?).

Anyway, enough of my ramblings....one should not waste too much paper.

An informal a cappella repeat of selected carols in the stairwell of the Union Building which has wonderful acoustics was inflicted on passers-by during the lunchbreak on December 17. Our Christmas marathon was completed the following week with consecutive performances at two local nursing homes.

1993 sees us with a new Musical Director as our previous MD was forced to retire due to increasingly heavy work commitments. Rehearsal has commenced on the main component of our June concert which is Romancero Gitano by Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco. It will be sung in Spanish to a classical guitar accompaniment supplied by Peter Huf, one of our talented Faculty of Science and Technology.

To our continuing concern the Singers are mainly University staff and local community members with a sprinkling of students who tend to disappear as study workloads increase towards the end of the year. Any ideas as to how we can recruit this rare species?

Greetings from Adjuloide!!!



A CHORAL-CHAT SUBSCRIBER GETS SOME EMAIL

As brought to you in the last edition of Erato, Choral-net and Choral-chat are alive and well and communicating regularly around our nation. For those of you with short memories, Choral-net is accessed through the email network which operates through university Internet accounts around Australia. Malcolm Herbert recently compiled a new mailing list, which appeared in the last Erato. If you are like most people who read Erato, you have long since lost your last Erato no. 70, even though it is a mine of useful reference information. Oh well. The Choral-net/chat lists will be reprinted regularly, possibly even in this Erato if I find there is room at the end, and I am feeling magnanimous.

Choral-chat is designed to handle the LARGE volumes of mail generated by choristers on the mailing lists. (See the above cartoon for the hippopotamic proportions Choral-chat can assume).

Choral-net is totally independent from Choral-chat; mail from one does not appear automatically on the other. Choral-net is for the more serious side of choral business between choral societies.

If you would like to get a subscription to either of these lists, you will need access to a computer account with outside mailing privileges; ie you should be able to send and receive email to and from places outside you institution. Ask your local computer centre how to get an account on a student designated machine. Once you have this basic requirement, email Malcolm Herbert at the choral-request address below to join the list. In your message, please include a) your full name, b) the choir you are involved with, and c) which lists you want to join: Choral-net, Choral-chat, and/or the Erato list (for publication).



SOGBALL - A Semi-Brief History

The original article was written by Lindsay MacDonald (SUMS 1969 - 1977) and Published in Eratos 19, 20 and 21 in 1976.

This was edited and updated by Serena Kay#(MonUCS 1975-1979, PUCS 1980-present) and printed as part of a Booklet for the 1984 Perth IV called "IV Traditions". Future articles will be published on: The Boat Races; The Pressies PJ's; The Gilbert Memorial Joke Prize; The Camp Review Prize and The Convenor's Chain.

In 1894 a certain M.G. Crane of Newton, Massachusetts, devised the game of "pushball", which called for an inflated leather-covered ball 72 inches in diameter and about 50 pounds in weight, and which was to be played by two teams of 11 men on a field 140 yards long. The goal consisted of two upright posts with a crossbar seven feet above the ground; a ball under the crossbar scored five points, while one over the bar counted eight points.

This game was played in a few places, notably Harvard University, but never really caught on as a national sport. Today there are no recognised rules for pushball, but the name is applied to any game using a very large ball in which opposing teams on foot or horseback try to advance the ball to their respective goals by continuous pushing, throwing, or batting, with no formal rules and few restrictions on the players.

Now it used to be customary to hold a Football Match at some stage during the IV Camp. This was inevitably a pretty ad hoc sort of affair, involving an arbitary number of indistinguishable players, many unsure which side they were on, and often encompassing several codes simultaneously (rugby, soccer, Rules etc). Not really the sort of stuff that reliable traditions are made of. Then in May 1971 the "Sogball" made its debut at Frensham School (the Canberra IV Campsite) and was an instant success. It was conceived and christened by Robert Kay (ex-SUMS, current-PUCS), designed and constructed in collaboration with Richard Hartley (ex-SCUNA), specifically as a more picturesque alternative to the IV Football Match. For a form that would be both economical in materials and straightforward in construction the icosahedron was chosen, having twenty identical faces, each an equilateral triangle. The basic idea was to make an outer skin of heavy vinyl, inside which would be inflated a latex meteorological balloon as a bladder; unfortunately, experience has shown that the life expectancy of such a balloon is only a few minutes, given the gentle attention of two or three hundred choristers. Attempts to use the Sogball without a bladder were somewhat disappopinting, despite the sealing of all seams, because the vinyl itself is slightly porous, thus allowing the contained air to escape. Alternative filling seems to be out of the question, for the volume of your average 9 foot diameter Sogball is such that it would weigh about ten tons if filled with water, and over one ton even with cork or foam plastic!

The original brown and orange Sogball made appearances in varying circumstances at each of the IV Festivals from 1971 to 1979, though nowhere more dramatically than its appearance from the balcony at the climax of the Puntracontal Prom Concert at Brisbane IV in 1972. Mention should also be made of the extra spice of danger added to the game in Tasmania in 1976 at Port Arthur, when the Sogball was inflated (blown-up!) with car exhaust gas.

The Sogball's useful life was limited, however, due to damage and the general leakage of air, and at the 1980 Perth IV, the Mark II Sogball (bigger and better than ever) made its appearance. This Sogball was professionally made and is a true sphere 3 meters in diameter, the largest of its kind made in Australia. The original colours could not be matched, so an arbitrary selection of yellow, blue and white was chosen and several panels printed with Intervarsity Choral Festival. The Sogball Mark II nearly met a premature demise at Sydney IV in 1988 where the Match was held on a beach! While no-one was watching the Sogball decided to take a swim and was finally rescued by some amazed but friendly surf-board riders.

What is the philosophy behind the game of Sogball? Probably the "stupidest occupation possible for the greatest number", in which case the present manifestation of the game is admirable. The nature of the Sogball itself (size, weight, resiliency, etc.) clearly indicates pushing as the means of projection. But what about team size? The problem is that for such a tactile sport everybody wants to join in, leading inevitably to a melee where everyone shoves or gets trampled and the ball goes nowhere.

To reduce its roughness the 1984 Perth IV used segregation where everyone had a chance to play against people of a similar build (ie. no busts vs balls!) Four matches were held with short men, tall women, short women and tall men. There has been one general rule - "there will be no grabbing of the ball" but over the years the rules have been reconstructed (eg. bribing and kidnapping of humanoid goalposts; tackling and/or tickling the 'big-boys') to suit the players. However, it can definitely be said that Sogball is firmly entrenched as an eccentric and colourful tradition of the Intervarsity Choral Festival.
