COVER STORY: "AUCS ARE NICE" NO LONGER!

A long standing choral cliché was convincingly blown away recently when a number of punishing photos were leaked to Erato's Adelaide correspondent. It is the first time in five years that there has been a change in the AICSA executive committee. Jonny, Joel and I are honoured and thrilled to be taking on these important roles within our association.

We have taken on the positions of the AICSA executive committee in an opportune time for the association. The previous AICSA executive has left us with a healthy association that is financially stable, produces a regular and stimulating newsletter, Erato, and has a dedicated and growing membership base. AICSA has overseen the immediately previous Intervarsity Choral Festival in Perth, perform Antonín Dvorák's Stabat Mater with the Prague Chamber Orchestra as part of the Perth International Arts Festival. The choir's performance was best described by The West Australian, on February 23, when it read, "One cannot too highly praise the choral singing of the well-trained ensemble." The Intervarsity movement is again enjoying an enviable reputation as a large chorus of high quality.

We aim to keep people informed and (hopefully) involved with the decisions that we are making and actions we are taking. The AICSA committee is a delightful collective of people with abundant skills, knowledge, experience and passion in regards to their role in AICSA. Their biographies feature later in this edition, so that you can become more familiar with your national office bearers. These people are all available for every chorister in the AICSA community to contact in matters relating to their portfolio. Each of them has a wealth of experience and knowledge in their role, and would be happy to chat with you about any issue, or provide any advice or assistance to you that you may require.

For example, any society or festival librarians can (and often do) contact the AICSA Librarian, Kim Asher, for advice and assistance with locating choral and orchestral scores. The treasurers may contact Joel Mendelson, secretaries feel free to liaise with Jonathan Webb, and society newsletter editors can contact Louise Tunbridge or Jonathan Webb. Finally we are very pleased to have on the committee for the first time in five years an archivist, and what a man to have in that position. He is a university academic and college tutor in Australian music history and has a doctorate. for which he studied the history of the Intervarsity movement. This study also produced his book entitled Laudate: The first fifty years of the Australian Intervarsity Choral Movement. Dr Peter Campbell is our resident expert in the history of AICSA and the Intervarsity choral movement, and would be happy to advise and assist any society or festival archivist in fulfilling their role.

There are more people, who are able to assist society and festival office bearers. In addition to those elected AICSA committee members (listed later in this edition), AICSA is proud to retain the services of Andrew Howell (film archivist), Rodney Reynolds (sound archivist), Bradley Dean (web manager) and Andrew Wailes (immediate past president). These people can also be contacted for advice and assistance. Rodney Reynolds, in particular, is able to provide a wealth of information to AICSA choirs and choristers about issues associated with making and selling recordings of choral concerts.

If you have an interest or opinion about AICSA or a part of AICSA, please send an email to president@aicsa.org.au to share your thoughts and views. I am keen to hear from anyone who feels strongly about, or would like to contribute to, our great national association. Please do email me, whether your matter is as simple as assisting to film parts of an IV or submitting an article to Erato, or as difficult as attracting corporate sponsorship or searching for that missing President's PJs trophy.

The AICSA executive committee is very open about our actions, and we will be distributing agendas and summaries of our meetings to the society presidents and festival representatives via the AIVCC emailing list. You can ask one of them or alternatively you can contact me directly to find out about our current actions and plans for the future. Otherwise, keep reading Erato, submit something to Erato, subscribe to AICSA's choral-announce emailing list and attend the next IV in Melbourne to stay in touch with actions and reports from the AICSA committee. I look forward to seeing many of you in Melbourne in January for the 56th Australian Intervarsity Choral Festival.

MEET AICSA'S NEWEST CHOIR

Andrew "Foetus" Wailes welcomes the choir of ACU's Melbourne campus into the fold

Melbourne can now claim four AICSA choirs, with the recent affiliation to AICSA of the Campus Choir of the Australian Catholic University St Patrick's (Melbourne) Campus. Known as the ACU National (Melbourne) Choir, the ensemble consists of approximately 45 singers, most of which are enrolled in the Bachelor of Music or Bachelor of Education (Music) degrees offered at the ACU's Melbourne campus. Whilst it is the official choir of the ACU's Melbourne campus, and students receive academic credit towards their course by participating in the choir as the principal ensemble study as part of the Music Department's program at the university, the choir is also open to non-members of the university (subject to an audition or invitation) and indeed there are already a number of singers from other faculties and universities who have chosen to participate in the choir.

The choir is under the direction of Andrew Wailes (former AICSA President, current MUCS conductor and former conductor of MonUCS) and aims to provide students and other interested participants with the chance to learn and perform choral music in a student-friendly ensemble that aims for musical excellence. Whilst a campus choir has existed in some form or another for some years at the university under the direction of Dr Roger Heagney and Dr Geoffrey Cox, the current choir has been given more prominence in the School of Arts and Sciences with the appointment of Andrew Wailes as specialist choral director, the appointment of a new staff accompanist specifically for the choir and a special budget allocation within the activities of the music program to enable an increased performing schedule.

Under the direction of Andrew Wailes the choir has already given numerous public performances, and rehearses and performs in the magnificent Central Hall, currently under restoration to its former position as one of Melbourne's best chamber music performance venues. Recent concerts have included works such as Vivaldi's Gloria and Pergolesi's Magnificat (with the Vivaldi Chamber Orchestra), music of the Russian Orthodox Liturgy by composers such as Rachmaninov, Bortniansky, Tchaikowsky and Chesnokov, the Melbourne premiere of Karl Jenkins' 'Adiemus' Songs of Sanctuary (with the Royal Melbourne Philharmonic Orchestra) and most recently John Rutter's Gloria and motets for choir, brass and organ by Rutter, Vaughan Williams, as well as a short setting of A Prayer for St Patrick by Dr June Nixon. This concert featured the Victorian Brass Ensemble, and included the world premiere performance of a new work for brass ensemble, percussion and choir entitled A Centenary Flourish, which was especially commissioned from young Melbourne composer Nicholas Buc to mark the centenary of Central Hall. This concert has been recorded for CD and has already received several radio broadcasts in Melbourne, and A Centenary Flourish has now been adopted by the Australian Catholic University as the official ceremonial anthem used at important university functions.

The choir has also performed at numerous important events, including the conferral ceremony of the Honorary Doctor of Philosophy to leading Australian conductor Richard Divall OBE at the Melbourne Town Hall, the ACU National open day, and has been invited to sing the Mass at the Chapel of Newman College, University of Melbourne. The choir also performed the Divine Liturgy of St John of Chrysostom (in Old Church Slavonic, Greek and Latin) at a Service of Divine Worship celebrating the Feast of the Protecting Veil at the ACU Campus Chapel. An invitation has been received for the choir to perform at a prestigious international liturgical conference in Melbourne in 2005, with a concert planned for St. Patrick's Cathedral.

Under the supervision of subject coordinator Andrew Wailes and Dr Diane Gome (ACU Music Co-ordinator) members are also encouraged to contribute to the choir in the same way that they do in other AICSA choirs; a student committee assists with the running of the choir in areas such as concert promotion, librarianship, hospitality and fundraising. Students also gain valuable experience in event management, publicity and program production. Following the success of the choir's recent concerts, several offers of corporate sponsorship have already been forthcoming, and plans are underway for another recording and further commissioning of new works by young local composers. It is hoped that in time, AICSA's newest choir will also be sending singers to IVCFs, with a number of singers already planning to participate at MIV next year.

The choir's next concert will be entitled "Baroque in Italy" and will feature Carissimi's baroque oratorio *Jepthe*, as well as Monteverdi's *Beatus Vir*, Andrea Gabrieli's *Filiae Jerusalem* and other works for six-part choir (performed with the Royal Melbourne Philharmonic Orchestra, and some of Melbourne's leading early music soloists).

Whilst this choir is very much thriving, one thing that still needs work is a suitable AICSA-style acronym by which the choir can become better known... the Campus Choir of the Australian Catholic University St Patrick's (Melbourne) Campus is a bit of a mouthful! CHURCH SOUNDS THAT WERE MADE IN HEAVEN

SCUNA conducted by Jonathan Powles St Christopher's Cathedral, 5th June

"The atttractive two-work program which the ANU Choral Society (SCUNA) presented last Saturday night drew a surprising capacity audience to the church. Happily, performances were worthy of the obvious expectations of those attending.

Vivaldi's *Gloria* is music of jubilation, and it received a performance which pleasingly captured the essential expressive qualities of the work. The 75-voice choir sang with wellcontrolled enthusiasm, providing an exhilarating performance that the conductor never allowed to get out of hand. The soloists, Catriona DeVere, Jenny Sawer (sopranos) and Myriam Miley-Read (mezzo), made fine contributions in the sequence of solos.

The lovely Requiem of French composer Gabriel Faure is different from most musical settings of the Latin Mass for the dead. In mood it is essentially music of consolation, gently lyrical and warmly expressive. Despite the size of the choir, rather large for Faure's light and generally contemplative choral writing, the body of sound was suitably restrained in the work's few moments of more assertive expression. Catriona DeVere sang with firm yet beautifully shaped tonal quality in the soprano solos, particularly moving in the Pie Jesu, while baritone Sitiveni Whippy brought a warm resonance to his singing of the Libera Me, the single stirring moment in the work. And the full orchestra made an important contribution to the success of the

performance.

Since he took over as musical director of this choir, conductor Jonathan Powles has made a considerable improvement in not only the tonal quality of the singing but also in the expressive approach to the works. The rewarding realisations of two such different works as the Vivaldi and the Faure were an excellent continuation of that improvement."

BRILLIANT RENDERING OF DIFFICULT WORK

PUCS, UWACS, Perth Oratorio with UWA Orchestra, conducted by Robert Braham Perth Concert Hall, 5th June

In its heyday, Mendelssohn's oratorio, Elijah, was as frequently performed as Handel's Messiah. These days it's rarely heard, no doubt, because unless it is thoroughly rehearsed, and guided by a practised hand, it can easily come to grief.

Happily, this was not the case at a packed Concert Hall on the weekend, and much of the credit must go the 280-strong

Choral Society and Perth Undergraduate Choral Society.

There was a gratifying unanimity of attack in this presentation, a choral tour de force, as the tale unfolded of the prophet, Eljiah, his miraculous cure of the widow's dying child, his excoriation of the villainous Ahab, his denunciation of the appalling Queen Jezebel and his ascent to heaven in a fiery chariot.

Lavish bouquets to alto Fiona Campbell, brilliant both visually and vocally. Whether as one of the Angels or as Jezebel, her singing had the stamp of complete authority. SoMark Alderson, in the eponymous role cut a dignified figure, his recitatives in particular, informed by an appropriate gravitas.

Tenor, Stuart Harvey brought real intensity to his contribution, even if there was a tendency at times to force vocal tone.

There were also strong contributions from Paul O'Neill, David Dockery, Katja Webb and Ngaire Greenwood. Young treble Daniel Mullaney did well as the youth.

Elijah abounds in ensemble singing among the soloists, and even if the vocal tone did not always blend ideally, it was clear that there had been thorough preparation of these crucial episodes.

Robert Braham's sensitive direction ensured a near-seamless unfolding of Mendelssohn's masterpiece of nearly three hours.

choir – much the same numbers as Mendelssohn directed in Elijah's first performance in 1846 – drawn from the Perth Oratorio, UWA prano Penelope Richards, too, came up to expectations as her voice projected effort-lessly into the auditorium.

Ambitious evening pays off

"The final part of this year's Rigg Bequest events, this concert presented the Victorian College of the Arts Orchestra under Marco van Pagee and the durable Choral Society of Melbourne University in a night's work that afforded challenges. The second part was a remarkably adventurous exercise.

This year marks the fiftieth birthday of Australian composer Carl Vine, an event

receiving little attention here. The programmes organisers tried to address this with a performance of Vine's large scale choral *Choral Symphony No.* 6. The work is in four linked movements that sets fragments of poetry in ancient tongues: an Akkadian

Creation myth, and excerpts from Homeric hymns.

This is a liberally coloured work with lots of focus on percussion, a prominent (too much so on this occasion) organ part, pages of rhythmically insistent choral writing, and moments of powerfully projected atmosphere, especially the initial incantation for male voices and the final salutations to Seline. Yet there is a jerkiness where the moments of inspired textural realisations are juxtaposed with stretches of English oratorio style bluffness.

The performance, under the choir's musical director Andrew Wailes, impressed

for the participants' communication of focus and collaboration in an often draining work. There is something of the Respighi touch about this symphony; it has, like the Italian composer's tone poems, a rich and intriguing texture packed with brilliantly controlled solo touches, while the actual harmonic and melodic content sounds flimsy.

The forces later combined for a full performance of Ravel's ballet *Daphnis and*

"The choir contributed ... erotic precipitation." *Chloe.* It was a tall order for a student orchestra, yet van Pagee kept his musicians alert and accurate, apart from some stretching horn arpeggios and the middle woodwind's obvious fatigue near the end. Still, the strings played at a high level, well prepared, and precisely following the conductor's direction. The choir contributed the requisite vocalisations with alternating placid languor and erotic precipitation. For a long work written to underpin a stage spectacle, the score as a discrete unit held one's interest, for the content of the pages we don't hear in the popular suite and for the hurdlenegotiating of van Pagee's performers."

The premium accommodation at camp (individual motel rooms and private lodge rooms) was very popular, with most registrants requesting this option. With such high demand, we decided that a combination of luck and early registration should be used to allocate these rooms. All registrations received by the cut-off date went into a draw and were allocated their choice of accommodation in order. Although obviously we were unable to give everyone the room of their choice, we are happy to announce that all those who requested premium accommodation will have the luxury of at least a private lodge room at Melbourne IV camp. By the time this sees print, registrants should have been contacted to advise of their room allocation.

Planning for the major events of MIV continues, particularly the two concerts. We will shortly be officially announcing the appointment of our musical staff for the Festival, as well as further information on the orchestral concert. With six months still to go until Melbourne IV, the stage is set for a fabulous Festival in 2005!

On another note, the MIV Committee would also like to congratulate the recentlyelected Committee of the 57th IVCF, Adelaide IV 2006; and welcome the new AICSA Executive who have just taken office. We look forward to helping out AIV in any way we can, and to working with AICSA towards a fantastic Melbourne IV 2005.

Getting Members – and keeping them

A change has occurred in the demographics of SUMS since I joined the choir in (cough) 1991: the number of new members signing up each year, and the proportion of them who have returned in subsequent years. For SUMS the number of new members we attract is falling, possibly reflecting the increased competition from new music based societies on campus (e.g Muse, Madrigals and Jazz Soc). But even of those we attract, fewer are coming back for one or more years in SUMS.

This year there are some ways we are trying to help this: (1) Regular and varied low-cost social events to attract and retain new student members; (2) Increased use of email to keep our members informed of upcoming social events; (3) Direct advertisement in Honi Soit (the campus newsletter) for rehearsals and concerts to build our profile on campus; (4) Section reps so that all members have someone within their section who can answer their questions, and assist with rehearsal discipline; (5) Improving committee rehearsal "behaviour" to break down the perception of "us" and "them" that sometimes develops. For second semester we are planning a further membership drive, as well as extensive graffiti of the campus via a chalking campaign.

A sellout, standing-room only, audience for the Mozart Requiem in the 500-seat Macquarie University Theatre on July 3rd. The management is still trying to figure out what we did right - promotion started late and early ticket sales were slow. [You sang Mozart's Requiem. End of story! Ed.] The choir was somewhat stunned with the full house. The excitement was evident in a vibrant choral sound and a disciplined focus that had not always been evident in rehearsal. We are still buzzing! Outstanding soloists helped to draw the punters - Stephen Bennett (bass), David Hamilton (tenor), Katharine Tier (mezzo), and Hye Seoung Kwon (soprano). They were in fine form, and the ensemble writing for two,

three and four voices was delivered with magical interpretation and vocal blend. The Requiem itself, of course, is one of the bestloved pieces in any choir's repertoire. The choir also presented *Quatre motets sur des themes gregoriens* by Durufle, and the 31piece orchestra provided the Respighi *Suite No.* 3 (Ancient Airs and Dances) for String *Orchestra*. The interval supper, by tradition provided by members of the choir, was again popularly received, and the audience was a bit delayed in returning for the second half. The post-concert party was high-volume chatter as we recollected the experience and, yes, regretted the mistake or two.

Preparation begins soon for the next Aus-

tralian Pops Orchestra program with a Vienna theme, to be followed closely by the annual Best of British event, both in the Opera House. For these we combine with our partners, Willoughby Symphony Choir. Membership, which had been closed because we could fit no more on the risers for the Mozart, will be reopened and further arrivals are expected for the second half of the year. Finally, we are planning a major end-of-year concert with a light-hearted theme which will include that splendid oratorio *The Seasonings* by the renowned scholar-composer from the eminent family, P.D.Q. Bach.

MonUCS is currently hard at work preparing for our September concert, *Pirates of Penzance*. This concert version of Gilbert and Sullivan's much loved operetta has revealed the depth of talent in the choir with all solo roles except for Frederick and Mabel being filled from within the choir. Perhaps our soloists were inspired by the many high quality acts at the MonUCS Soiree, held in late July. Following the success of the Soiree at Easter-Fest, MonUCS decided to hold it's own Soiree in which a surprising number of Freshers performed and wowed the audience.

Despite some disappointments earlier in the year, a late change of venue and date for our Carmina Burana performance and the unavailability of scores for our first choice for this September's concert, MonUCS has forged on. A significant financial recovery, the development of a new officer hand over portfolio system and the high quality of freshers this year has MonUCS looking to be in a very promising position for the 2004-5 committee. The incoming committee is looking forward to the combined concert with MUCS and ROCS in December performing Mozart's Solemn Vespers and Rutter's Gloria. This is the perfect lead up to MIV '05.

Like many AICSA choirs MonUCS is facing a number of challenges. Federal cuts in funding to universities is trickling down through the uni structure and is affecting the level of funding available to societies like AICSA choirs. The availability of cheap mass entertainment has reduced audiences to amateur musical performances. Public schools have the fewest music programs as ever in the last century, meaning less students arrive at uni having ever sung in a choir and so are less likely to join an AICSA choir.

I believe that AICSA has a role to play in addressing these and other issues affecting the choirs. It is time that AICSA needs to address its purpose and goals and consider whether the health of its member choirs are the concern of that choir alone or whether a national strategy to assist its member choirs and transform AICSA into a truly supportive umbrella organisation is timely and appropriate.

This is not to criticize the efforts of past AICSA committees but to highlight that often the way forward need not be prescribed by the way past. That the only constant is change and that unless we also change we may become lost in the past.
